### **Grants Received for the Thomas Griswold House**

In early June 2021, the Guilford Keeping Society announced "The Thomas Griswold House Project" with a mailing to members and friends. This preservation program has two immediate goals. The first is the prep and painting of the exterior of the Museum. The second is the repair/restoration of the exterior and interior of the property's woodworking barn.

We have been fortunate to receive two prestigious grants to assist in our endeavors. Funds must be raised to match the \$5,000 1772 Foundation grant awarded by Preservation Connecticut. Further we hope to raise monies that will enable us to go beyond the repair of the exterior and to restore the interior as an 18th-19th century workshop which can be used for demonstrations of techniques and tools of that time period.

Your continued support is vital to preserve and share one of the pre-eminent examples of the history, character and culture of our community. You encourage us to work hard to keep the foundations of our beloved Guilford strong for all to experience now and in the future. # The Thomas Griswold House Project

We are very excited to announce that the Guilford Keeping Society was awarded two competitive grants for the Thomas Griswold House and its woodworking barn, which will be named for Carl Balestracci and will house an amazing collection of period tools from the Hoff family.

The Society received a 1772 Foundation matching grant for \$5,000 from Preservation Connecticut to paint the exterior of the Museum, and a \$1,500 Guilford Foundation grant to be used toward the restoration of the Griswold House woodworking barn.

The 1772 Foundation Grant award was perfectly timed as Jonathan Wuerth (bottom right) and Stephen VanDerMaelen (bottom left) had just reinstalled the totally restored front windows of the Thomas Griswold House. The TGH front window project was made possible by a generous \$5,500 Guilford Foundation Grant.

The second grant was awarded by The Guilford Foundation to be used toward the restoration of the Balestracci-Hoff Barn. It is our hope that with additional funds this rustic building will be restored to become a woodworking display area and a viable working area for demonstrations and sharing Guilford's long history and techniques of 18th and 19th century master craftsmen.

We have gratefully received donations to The Griswold House Project Campaign from a number of individuals and families who generously support our mission to collect, preserve and share the history and heritage of Guilford for present and future generations.

Their vision sustains and encourages us. They have our undying appreciation. We invite more donations - the results of which will be seen by all - to help us complete this important work!



# Barn, Barns, Barns and Then There Are Ours

Barns have always been important outbuildings in Guilford since its founding in 1639. Since then, they have been essential structures associated with home life, farms and economics. Through the years many have become outmoded, been moved or lost through decay or being razed for urban sprawl.


"We're losing our barns by the droves," said Todd Levine, an architectural historian for the Connecticut Trust for Historic Preservation. "Many tumbled down because of decay or were torn down for new development. Others were simply too costly to maintain. And, as agriculture declined, barns no longer served a purpose."

"We're under the gun with the budget cuts," Mr. Levine said. "We've tried to show how important these structures are to our state's heritage and to its future. Years hence, when all we have left to offer in Connecticut is sprawl, the barns will already be gone. It will be too late."

As stewards of two historic museums and properties the GKS concurs. Our mission statement is "The Guilford Keeping Society collects, preserves and shares the history and heritage of Guilford, Connecticut for present and future generations".

The Guilford Keeping Society did a complete restoration of the Medad Stone Tavern barn in 2014-15. This year the Society has submitted a grant application to repair the deterioration of the woodworking barn and to create a viable working space at the Thomas Griswold House Museum. The barn named the "Balestracci-Hoff Barn", is located behind the house. It is in dire need of immediate restoration to save it and to create a highly desirable working woodshop space available for demonstrations and use of time-honored woodworking techniques which are slowly becoming a lost art.

We are delighted to inform you that the Guilford Keeping Society has received a \$1500 grant awarded by The Guilford Foundation to support the Balestracci-Hoff Barn Project.



### **GKS Colonial Camp**

A Colonial Camp will be held at the Thomas Griswold House Museum in August. What was life-like for a Guilford child in the 1700's? Campers at the Keeping Society's Colonial Life Camp will spend an adventurous week finding out. Campers will play games from the period, watch a blacksmith at work, and try some crafts that colonial boys and girls enjoyed. There will be hands on activities and colonial games. Campers will keep journals, as well as eat some popular Colonial dishes.

The Colonial Life Camp runs from August 2 -6 and a second week August 9-13 from 9:30 to 12:30. Please register your child for only one week. This camp takes place at the Thomas Griswold House Museum, 171 Boston St., Guilford.

**Cranbrook Tower Ornament** 

This year's GKS ornament is the Cranbrook Tower built in 1869. It was initially built as a stone water tower with a windmill on top to supply fresh water to the summer estate of Simeon Chittenden. The tower is a Guilford landmark that was in use until 1915 when Guilford established its own water system, and the windmill was removed in 1927. During World War II and in the mid-1950s the tower was used as an observation tower by civil defense groups to detect airplanes. Identical plaques over the front and rear doors commemorate the 250th Anniversary of the founding of Guilford in September 1639.

The Cranbrook Tower Ornament is available for purchase at the Thomas Griswold House and Medad Stone Tavern Museums, at GKS events and at guilfordkeepingsociety.com for \$20 ea. A set of the six GKS Ornaments is available for \$105.
